All are welcome here, and we are so delighted that you are with us. Please do not hesitate to let us know what your spiritual needs are, so that we may be present to you and continue to welcome you into our community. We welcome you, with joy and gratitude, to St. Matthew's Episcopal Church. Whether you have been here many times, or this is your first time worshiping with us, we hope and pray that here you may know the invitation of our endlessly creating God towards a oneness of relationship, that you will enter deeper into communion with Christ and feel the presence of the indwelling Holy Spirit guiding you as you journey onwards on the Way of Love. As individuals and as holy community we experience God's Self through our shared worship, prayer, song, silence, the lifegiving nature of the Sacraments, and all we do to tend to and serve those in the world outside our doors.

We are nearly at the end of the season after Pentecost which is often described as the "long green growing season", for it is the longest liturgical season of the church year-beginning with the Feast Day of Pentecost, this year on May 28, and continuing through the Feast Day of Christ the King on November 26, immediately before the first Sunday of Advent on December 3.

We refer to this church season as a growing season because it is a time to focus on our spiritual growth as believing people who are hungry to know more. The scripture lessons we read during this time offer particularly rich formation through the stories of our salvation history as heard in the Hebrew Scriptures (Old Testament); this year we are using "Track 1" for the Old Testament reading and psalm, which follows major stories and themes read mostly continuously from week to week, beginning in Year A (this year) with the book of Genesis. It is a time to let this wisdom, which also includes our New Testament reading (Epistle) and Gospel reading, settle into our souls as we invite it to transform us and form that 'firm foundation' that prepares us for our own witness in the world.

The Israelites again did what was evil in the sight of the LORD, after Ehud died. Then the Israelites cried out to the LORD for help; for he had nine hundred chariots of iron, and had oppressed the Israelites cruelly twenty years.

With the Father and the Son, he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.
