

We also have individual cups available that contain a small amount of wine and a wafer (the consecrated bread); please put your hands in front of you as if you were praying if you'd like this option. Intinction (dipping the wafer into the chalice) is not permitted. Grape juice and gluten-free wafers are available upon request. If you wish to receive a blessing, please come forward to the altar and cross your arms.

Hymn "The First Nowell" vs.1-3, #109, The Hymnal 1982

We invite all children to proceed to the back of the church at this time to participate in the telling of the Gospel story as they set the Creche for us. Everyone is encouraged to participate. Just as Christ is for everyone, so is the joyful telling of his birth for everyone.

The Gospel Story: The Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ (as brought alive for us by our young people)

Narrator This night is like no other night. It is time to pray and sing our way to Bethlehem. The little town we seek sits in the hill country some ten miles south of Jerusalem and in the center of the village is a small inn. On this night, it is overflowing with people seeking a place to eat and sleep. Behind the inn is a dark stable, where a gray donkey chews his barley and weary oxen rest after the long day's working in the valley. Sheep are asleep nearby. All is quiet and still.

Hymn: "O Little Town of Bethlehem", vs.1 (sung by all)
O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie! Above thy
deep and dreamless sleep, the silent stars go by; yet in thy dark
streets shineth the everlasting Light; the hopes and fears of all the
years are met in thee tonight.

Narrator As night falls, two more travelers come slowly up the road. Look, there is a young woman about to be a mother, with her husband. They are Joseph and Mary from Nazareth! They have traveled for days to come to this city where King David was born so long ago because the Roman emperor wants to count them, so he can take their money as a tax. It is late, and Mary is so weary. Where will they sleep? There is no room in the inn. They decide to sleep with the animals.

Hymn: "Once in Royal David's City", vs. 1 (sung by all) Once in royal David's city stood a lowly cattle shed, where a mother laid her baby in a manger for his bed: Mary was that mother mild, Jesus Christ her little child.

Narrator Stars brighten slowly in the sky. All creation holds its breath. Suddenly, from the stable, comes the cry of a newborn child! Mary gently wraps the baby in a blanket and lays him in the feed box that his father has filled with straw.

Hymn: "Away in a Manger", vs. 1 (sung by all) Away in a manger, no crib for his bed, the little Lord Jesus laid down his sweet head. The stars in the bright sky looked down where he lay, the little Lord Jesus asleep on the hay.

Narrator In the hills outside Bethlehem, shepherds watch their shadowy sheep. All at once, the dark is lost in light, and in the midst of that light is something even brighter: the faces of angels. The fearful shepherds hear music in the sky, and a voice says clearly, "Do not be afraid. Listen! I bring you news of great joy, a joy to be shared by all people. Today in the City of David a Savior is born! He is Christ, the Lord." The angels are praising God and singing: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will to all people, everywhere." The shepherds run with joy across the fields to Bethlehem to the barn behind the inn. There, they find the Holy Family and the Baby himself in the center of all that love.

Hymn: "It came upon the midnight clear", vs. 1 (sung by all) It came upon the midnight clear, that glorious song of old, from angels bending near the earth to touch their harps of gold. "Peace on the earth, good will to men, from heaven's all gracious King." The world in solemn stillness lay to hear the angels sing."

Narrator So now we all come, following the star, to find Immanuel, which means 'God-with-us.' We come, as people have come through all the ages, to bring our own gifts to this Child who is God's gift to us. Bring your gifts of starlight and of yourselves to place around the manger. Together, we enter the mystery of Christmas on this holy night, filled with overflowing joy, wonder, and love.

Hymn: "The First Nowell" vs. 4-6, #109, The Hymnal 1982 Sung by the congregation while the children are placing the starlights at the Creche and then going back to their seats.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit, he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son, he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.





for you alone are God, living and true, dwelling in light
inaccessible from before time and forever. Fountain of life and
source of all goodness, you made all things and fill them with your
blessing; you created them to rejoice in the splendor of your
radiance. Countless throngs of angels stand before you to serve you
night and day; and, beholding the glory of your presence, they offer
you unceasing praise. Joining with them, and giving voice to every
creature under heaven, we acclaim you, and glorify your Name, as
we sing:

The Sanctus S-129, The Hymnal 1982 "Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of power and might"

The Celebrant continues

We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave

himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

Celebrant and People

We praise you, we bless you, we give thanks to you, and we pray to you, Lord our God.

The Celebrant continues

Lord, we pray that in your goodness and mercy your Holy Spirit may descend upon us, and upon these gifts, sanctifying them and showing them to be holy gifts for your holy people, the bread of life and the cup of salvation, the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ. Grant that all who share this bread and cup may become

one body and one spirit, a living sacrifice in Christ, to the praise of your Name.

Remember, Lord, your one holy catholic and apostolic Church, redeemed by the blood of your Christ.

Reveal its unity, guard its faith, and preserve it in peace.

Remember all who minister in your Church.

Remember all your people, and those who seek your truth.

Remember all who have died in the peace of Christ, and those whose faith is known to you alone; bring them into the place of eternal joy and light.

And grant that we may find our inheritance with the Blessed Virgin Mary, with patriarchs, prophets, apostles, and martyrs, with **St. Matthew** and all the saints who have found favor with you in ages past. We praise you in union with them and give you glory through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, all honor and glory are yours, Almighty God and Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, for ever and ever. **AMEN**.


